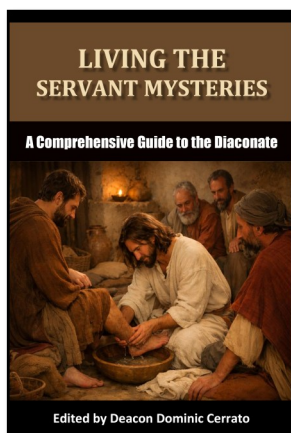

In the end, I am simply one poor beggar sharing with others where the food is found, passing along the grace I myself have received from the Lord who alone nourishes and sustains our diaconal vocation.

Living the Easter Season As a Deacon

The season of Easter invites the entire Church into the joy of the Resurrection. Yet for the deacon this sacred season holds a particular resonance. Ordained not only to serve but to reveal Christ the Servant within the life of the Church, the deacon is called during these fifty days to live and proclaim the victory of the Risen Lord. Easter is therefore not merely the remembrance of an event in salvation history. It is the living presence of Christ who continues His mission through the Church, and in a distinctive way through the ministry of the deacon.

The Resurrection reveals the full meaning of service. Christ who humbled Himself in obedient love, even to death on the Cross, is raised in glory by the Father. As the Apostle Paul writes, “God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name” (Phil 2:9). The Church teaches that the Resurrection confirms all that Christ did and taught and manifests the triumph of divine love over sin and death (CCC 651). For the deacon, this truth illuminates his vocation. Service is not weakness, nor is it mere assistance within the life of the Church. Rather, it is participation in the victorious love of Christ, a love that conquers through self-gift.

To live Easter as a deacon therefore begins, as all authentic ministry does, with the interior life. The joy of the Resurrection must first be received before it can be proclaimed. Prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, fidelity to the Liturgy of the Hours, and attentive meditation on the Easter Scriptures allow the deacon to encounter the Risen Lord personally. In these moments of quiet communion, the heart of the servant is renewed. The deacon comes to recognize that the same Christ whom he proclaims in the Gospel and serves at the altar is alive and active within his own life.

From this interior encounter flows the deacon’s ministry of the Word. During the Easter season the Church proclaims the great narratives of the Resurrection and the missionary preaching of the Apostles in the Acts of the Apostles. When the deacon proclaims the Gospel and preaches, he does so not merely as a reader of sacred texts but as a witness to the living Christ. His voice echoes the proclamation of the early Church: “This Jesus God raised up, and of that we all are witnesses” (Acts 2:32). Authentic preaching during Easter radiates hope, inviting the faithful to live as people transformed by the Resurrection.

The altar also reveals the Easter identity of the deacon. In assisting the priest at the Eucharistic sacrifice, the deacon stands at the place where the mystery of the Resurrection becomes sacramentally present. The Eucharist is the memorial of the Lord’s Passion and Resurrection, the sacrament in which the Risen Christ gives Himself as food for His people. The *Catechism* teaches that in the Eucharist “the sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist are one single sacrifice” (CCC 1367). Each time the deacon prepares the altar, elevates the chalice, or invites the faithful to exchange the sign of peace, he participates in the living mystery of the Resurrection made present in the Church.

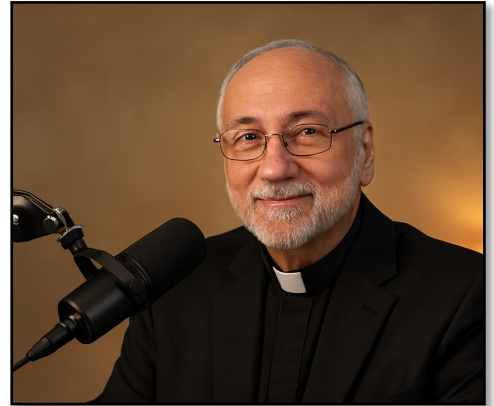
Finally, the deacon lives Easter through his ministry of charity. The Resurrection sends the Church outward in mission. The same Christ who appeared to the disciples also commanded them to proclaim the Gospel to all nations (Mt 28:19). The deacon embodies this missionary impulse in a particular way. His service among the poor, the suffering, and the forgotten becomes a visible sign that the Risen Christ continues to act in the world through the charity of His Church. When the deacon accompanies the lonely, assists the needy, or encourages the discouraged, he becomes a living witness that death does not have the final word.

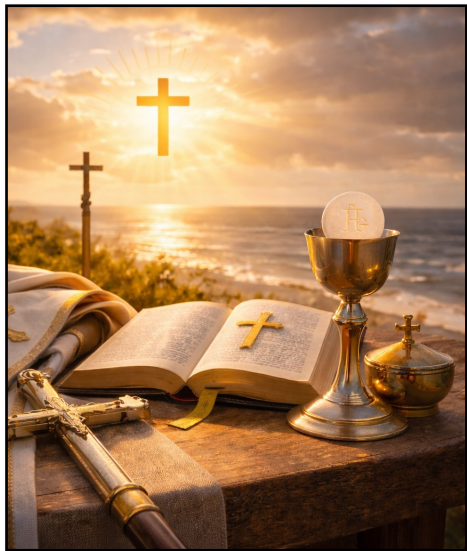
Latest Posting: A Beauty That Wounds

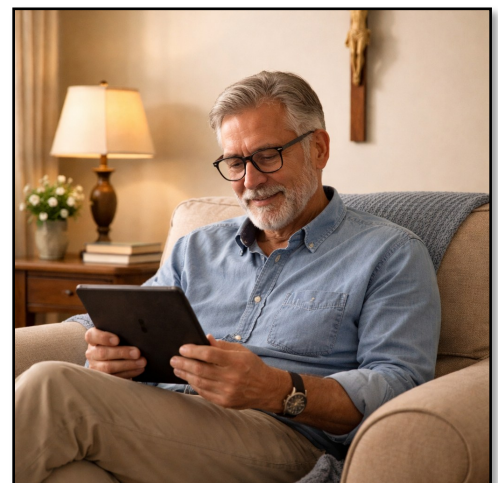

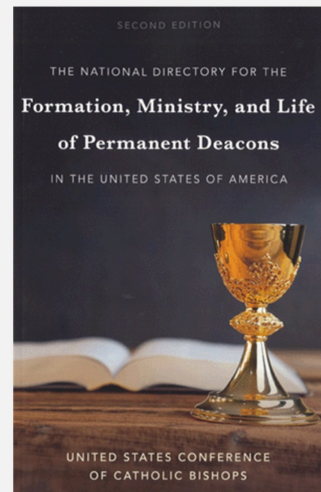


